Current Job and Tenure Status: I am currently employed as a Professor of Spanish and Director of Undergraduate Studies/Spanish at Baylor University in Waco, Texas. I have held this position since August of 1993. I received tenure in April, 2000.

Teaching 1993-2019

- 2002-2018, Director of Undergraduate Studies—Spanish: I advise both majors and non-majors on their choices of Spanish classes; I make that graduating majors have met all requirements for graduation; I help manage enrollment in all Spanish classes; I advise graduating seniors on career options; in 2002-03, I helped revise the major/minor and reviewed course offerings in Spanish; in 2005 I conducted the SACS assessment of the undergraduate language requirement in Spanish.
- During the past twenty-six years I have taught all levels of Spanish, including Spanish 3302 (Intermediate Conversation), Spanish 4330 Advanced Grammar, Composition and Conversation, Spanish 3350 (first half of the Spanish literature survey—Medieval, Renaissance and Baroque) and two BIC courses: World Cultures II, the second course in the Baylor Interdisciplinary Curriculum, and Examined Life III (a capstone for graduating seniors in BIC). During the Fall, '07 semester, I taught three courses: Spanish 2320, Intermediate Spanish, Spa 3300 Intro to Hispanic Literature, and Spanish 3350 (Spanish literature through the 18th century). I have also taught the graduate course Spa 5310—Medieval Spanish Literature. The majority of my language teaching is based on the communicative method (i.e., meaningful input) which focuses on developing proficiency in five different language related skills or areas: reading, writing, listening, speaking and culture. In the grammar class, I do a very detailed review of all of the major grammar areas that students need to master in order to be good teachers and scholars. In the literature class, my emphasis is on giving the students a wide sampling of all genres from the Medieval, Renaissance and Baroque Spanish literature. My class introduces them to the major works and authors from those periods of Spanish literature. They are also required to write four short interpretations and one in-depth research paper.
